New Braille Students at BLTS

Recently several of the BLTS Braille transcribers were trained in the new Unified English Braille (UEB) code thanks to a series of lessons by teacher Connie Risjord and additional refreshers offered by the Midwest Regional Braille Conference held in Madison in May of this year. In a happy coincidence the BLTS office also received several calls from people interested in learning to be Braille transcribers! Some of them were better served by taking the online Braille course, due to their physical location and busy schedules. Our own Sue Danz, BLTS Braille coordinator, is taking the online Braille course both for her own training and to provide some experience and feedback to BLTS on how this course works for students. One student, who is working full-time in Madison, is taking lessons via email with Connie Risjord. Two more individuals are taking lessons in-person and are progressing very nicely. These two people are being taught by Patricia Herrling and Connie Risjord. This is wonderful news for BLTS. As some of our volunteers are ready to cut back or retire their transcribing duties, we need to have new people coming into the organization to fill those requests. Imagine what we could do if we advertised. Some of these new students came to us by word of mouth from former or current transcribers; so, when you are talking to your friends or acquaintances who are looking for a meaningful and rewarding way to fill their days, remember BLTS and Braille transcription.

Bulleted Lists

Braille Formats 2011 introduced two new symbols representing any symbol used in the primary and secondary levels of a bulleted list. The symbols were based on level, not what was actually there in print. UEB symbols for bullets follow the print symbol regardless of level. The symbol for a bullet is the same in both codes. The difference is that in EBAE it means any mark at the first level, whereas in UEB it means "bullet" and nothing else.)

Bullet

A bullet in print is a filled in circle. Any other marks are shown exactly as they appear, whether they are hollow circles, squares, checkmarks, stars or gears. Some of these symbols, such as the circle, square, triangle and checkmark, already have official UEB configurations. Some will need to be transcriber-devised. See *Rules of Unified English Braille 2013*, Sections 3.22.1 and 11.7 and *Guidelines for Technical Material*, Section 14 for lists of shape symbols and how to use them. Follow *Braille Formats 2011* for formatting guidelines. (*Braille Formats 2015* will be coming soon.)

The symbols for the square (...) and circle (...) are preceded by the shape indicator (...). A grade 1 indicator (...) precedes the shape indicator to prevent it from being read as a contraction.

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BLTS Library Update Fall, 2016

Our print/braille collection has recently been weeded. Many older books were in poor shape and were eliminated from the shelves to make space for the new books we have been producing in the UEB code. Thanks to volunteer Kathy Dorn for helping with this project! Speaking of volunteers, we have a new helper in the library unpacking boxes. Sandy Adams, a retired vision teacher and BLTS Board member, has been coming in once a week to help out with this task. The library couldn't function without this support.

The BLTS Library Committee met in June, 2016, to review the status of new books for the library. We will be adding 5 nonfiction titles, 5 fiction titles and several cookbooks to the collection. Several handicraft books will also be produced. We will be meeting again in the fall to select additional books to add to the collection. If you have a suggestion of a book you think our readers would enjoy, please let the office know about it!

We recently purchased new bookends for the library. These were necessary to keep the braille books straight on the shelves and reduce bending of the spines. It also keeps the library looking neat and tidy.

We have added 15 new library users since January 2016. Many of these new users hear about us by word of mouth from happy library borrowers talking to their friends. It is nice to be appreciated.

In 1941 Val graduated from Whitewater State Deachers' Callege earning a Bachelors' Degree in Education. She taught high school commercial subjects in granton and Todi,

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In 1945 she joined her sister Dorothea in Washington, D.C., where she served as an accountant in the Special Division of Naval Personnel, Navy Department, Washington, D.C. She retired after 30 years, returning to Wisconsin in 1980.

Val became interested in learning braille and earned Library of Congress braille certification in 1982. She contributed many hours to BLTS/VBTI.

Val was a lovely and caring person. She will be very much missed.
