President's Report February 2020

The year 2020. I like the sound of that. It is a nice round number. It reminds me of the old



movie "2001: A Space Odyssey". When I saw that, oh so long ago, it was hard to think about what life would be like that far into the future. We should be flying around in space cars by now and having our food delivered completely prepared into our kitchens and having robots do all of our housework. Well, some of those things are already possible and probably the rest are not far off.

For the blind and visually impaired technology is also moving forward. We now have all sorts of devices to assist in everyday living, such as walking sticks that sense boundaries and obstacles, audio books, screen readers for computers and smart phones, etc. As nice as all of this technology can be, it does not replace the need to be fully literate, to be able to both read and write. We sighted folks use technology but we still like to curl up with a good paperback or stick up post-it reminders on the refrigerator. Like so much in life it is a case of and/both, not either/or. BLTS's mission of "transcribing reading materials into braille" is still as necessary as ever. As it states in our Statement of Purpose, "our organization is based on our belief that all people have the right to the opportunity to read."

To that end, BLTS has been busy providing that opportunity to the blind and visually impaired community. The demand for braille transcription for clients increased in 2019, and we also increased the number of library borrowers for our braille reading materials. Our Education Committee has also been busy sponsoring a new initiative, led by Lindy Walton, of holding monthly "Library Conversations" to provide a forum for our transcribers to learn and share information, as well as build community. We have also started a new class of potential braille transcribers. They are a lively group and we hope to increase our roster of transcribers to meet the demand for braille materials in the coming year.

Making sure people know about our organization and services has been a goal for the past year. We have increased communication to vision teachers and parents groups, as well as participated in Midwest Braille conferences. We have joined forces with local organizations such as WisBraille, to publicize our joint services at forums and public speaking opportunities, and optimized the use of our website and social media to make sure our services can be found by those who need them.

In October 2019 we celebrated our first full year at our new location at Watts Road. These new facilities have made it easier for us to do our daily work and host the student classes, continuing education and social events that help make BLTS maintain its excellence in braille transcribing and remain an energetic, forward moving organization meeting the reading needs of the visually impaired.

I look forward to a great year for BLTS in 2020. Spread the word about BLTS to anyone looking for meaningful volunteer work or who might use our services!

SIX-YEAR-OLD TEACHES BRAILLE CLASS

The braille class is moving along with Patricia Herrling teaching a lesson one week and Connie Risjord conducting a study session the next. The study sessions are designed to review, do exercises, and bring in visitors who will introduce the students to the broader world of vision impairment and braille readers.

In October a visitor to the session was a six-year old boy named Donovan, who came with his mother and his special education assistant Lisa Stefl. Donovan was born blind, is in first grade, and already reads braille. Lisa, who is a certified braillist, is his braille teacher. Lisa says that he has been learning braille for a few years and does a great job. He reads mostly uncontracted braille at this time along with alphabetic contractions.

Since at the time of the visit Donovan's reading ability was better than our students, Connie asked if he would like to be teacher for the day. Donovan is a boy full of fun and enthusiasm, and he leapt at the chance. He had everyone entranced. It was a day to be remembered.

Why "Dear Pearl"

A burning question in all of your minds is why do we call our newsletter "Dear Pearl." Here is the answer. Those of us who were certified 15 to 20 years ago had to transcribe a letter, the salutation of which was "Dear Pearl." We did this before we did our manuscript and the letter contained all sorts of difficult transcribing situations. It was very challenging to do but was part of our agency's teaching method. (pre-Braille 2000) Also, it is my understanding that in the late 1950's or 60's the braille code was changed and the ar contraction was elevated as a higher level contraction than ea so that words like "dear" and "pearl" would be transcribed differently than they had been and the "Dear Pearl" letter was used to get transcribers used to the change.

Observations

A priority goal for 2019 was to look at ways of increasing our communication to schools and potential library users. We have analyzed our website, looked at social media and other websites listing braille lending libraries to make sure we are included and looked at communication with Wisconsin schools and parents of blind students. During 2019 we held a print/braille workshop to introduce/refresh transcribers to the print/braille process. This resulted in 70 new children's books becoming available for borrowing from our library. **A priority goal for 2020** will be to continue to capitalize on our communication with library borrowers, as well as a major look at our braille library collection to make room for new additions and remove unused/poor condition books.
